

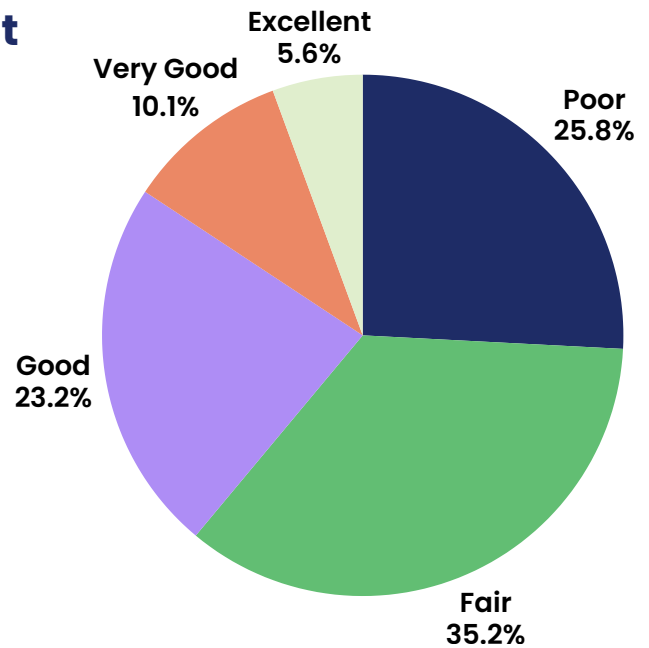
PrEP Awareness



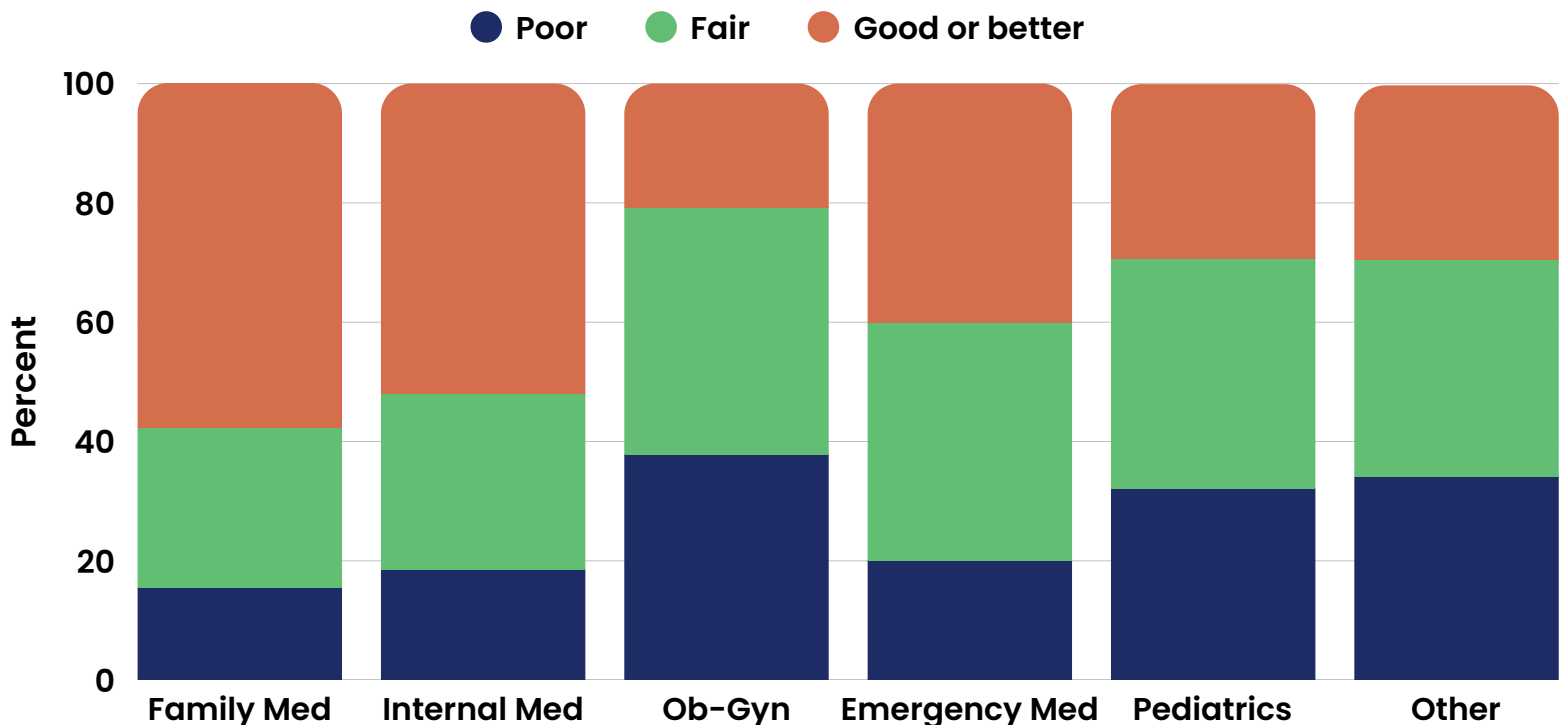
Overall, 5.6% of providers have excellent knowledge of PrEP, the medication that prevents HIV.

57.8% of family med/primary care and 51.9% of internal medicine providers have a good or better knowledge that PrEP can prevent HIV.

40% of emergency medicine, 29.2% of pediatrics, and 20.7% of Ob-Gyn providers have a good or better knowledge that PrEP can prevent HIV.

About the PrEP Provider Survey

AIDS Free Pittsburgh conducts routine surveys to evaluate our region's efforts toward ending the HIV epidemic, and to guide future work. In Fall 2025, AFP partnered with providers at UPMC to conduct a PrEP awareness survey with 267 responses. All survey responses were self-reported.

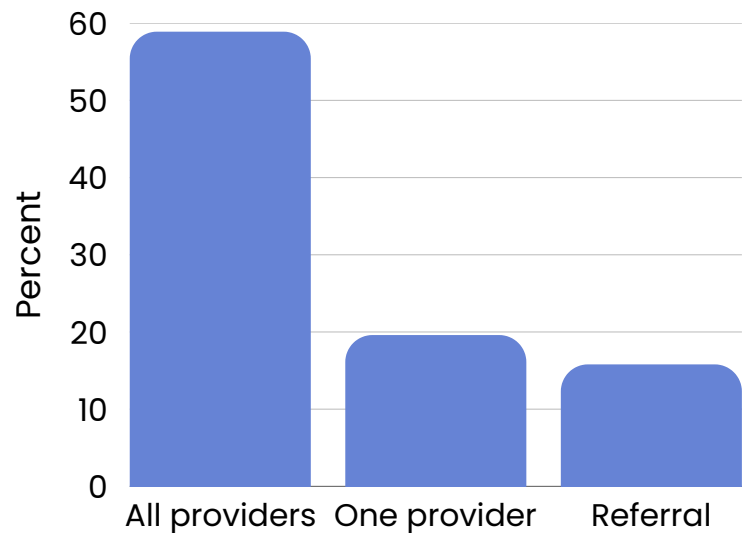
Most feasible implementation of PrEP in the provider's clinical practice setting:

58.9% of providers said all providers should receive training and prescribe PrEP.

19.6% of providers said one provider should be appointed as the PrEP specialist at each clinic.

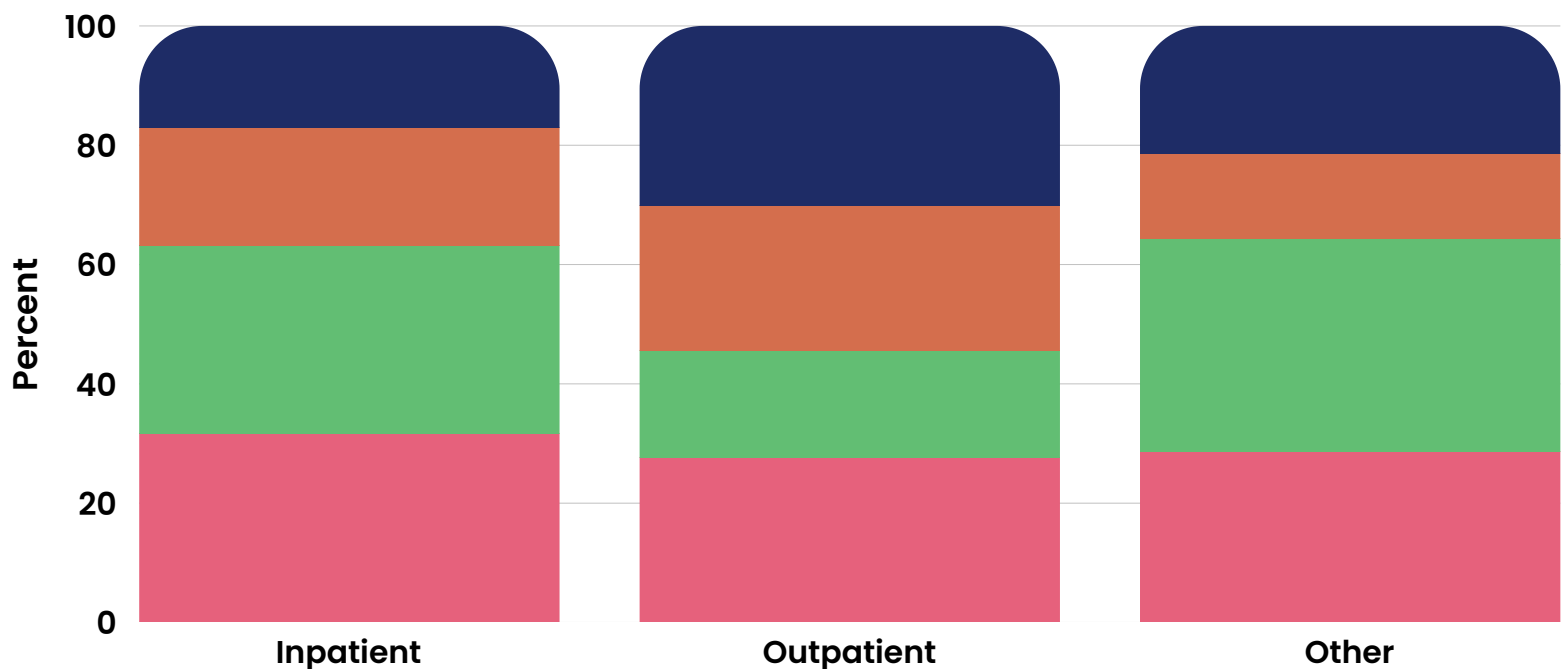
15.8% of providers said they would rather refer patients to other clinics.

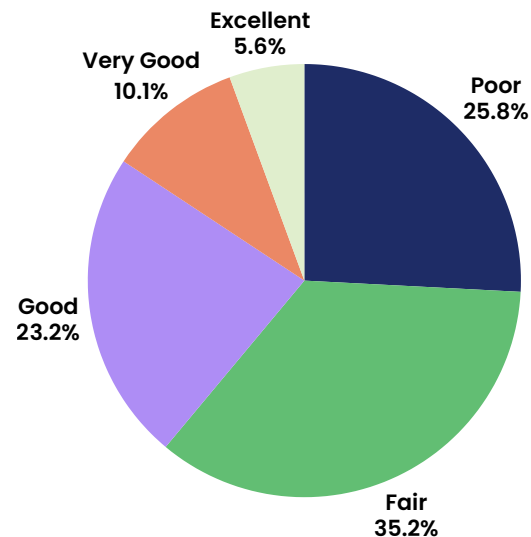


Overall, 5.6% of providers have excellent knowledge of PrEP, the medication that prevents HIV.

33.3% of providers had good or very good knowledge of PrEP.

35.2% of providers had fair knowledge of PrEP.

25.8% of providers had poor knowledge of PrEP.

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PrEP Prescribing Practices



Overall, 36.7% of providers have prescribed PrEP, the medication that prevents HIV.

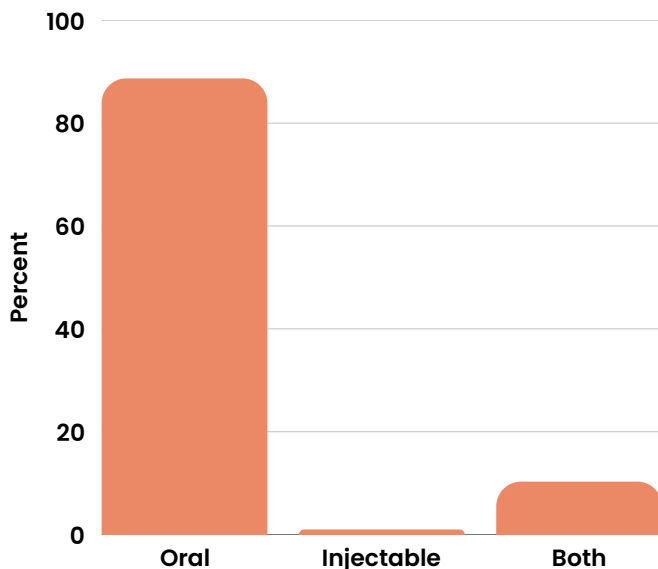
44.6 % of providers have had patients ask about PrEP.

46.4% of providers have initiated a conversation about PrEP.

33.3% of providers have referred a patient for PrEP.

Type of PrEP Prescribed*



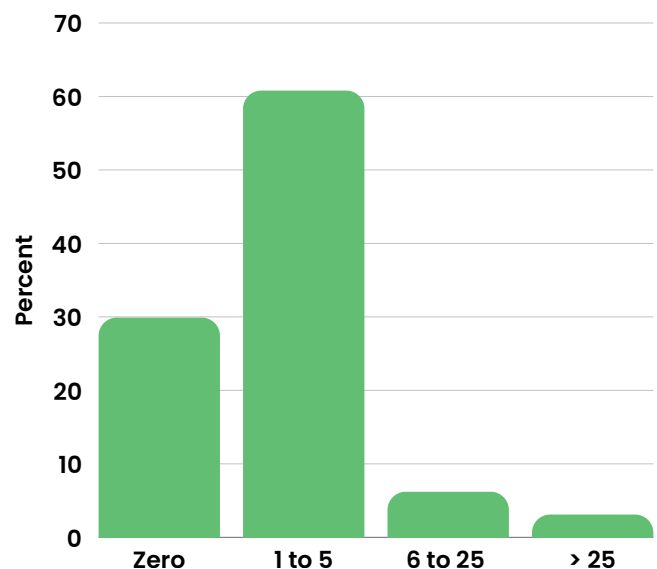

75% of NPs have started at least one patient on PrEP.

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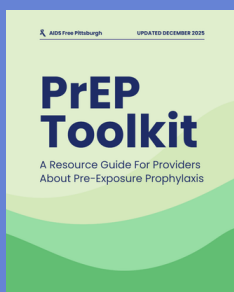

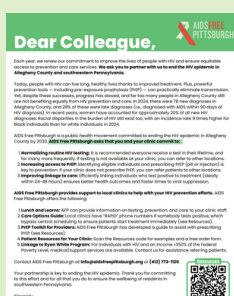
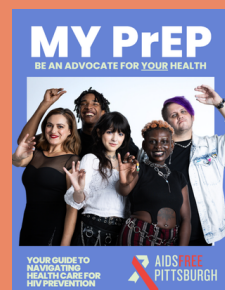
